## **Concept II**

When, in 1955, the A.A. groups confirmed the permanent charter for their General Service Conference, they thereby delegated to the Conference complete authority for the active maintenance of our world services and thereby made the Conference-excepting for any change in the Twelve Traditions or in Article 12 of the Conference Charter-the actual voice and the effective conscience for our whole Society. [Long Form]

The first Concept gives all A.A. members the huge responsibility of preserving Alcoholics Anonymous and the authority to take action. Concept II begins to lay out a structure for groups to *delegate* its participation through their trusted servants.

It is not possible for all A.A. members to show up at every meeting to help make decisions. In fact, it is rare to have a majority of group members attend their own group's group conscience meetings. Therefore...

Home groups elect a G.S.R. [General Service Representative] to be their voice and vote at local meetings and at area assemblies. In turn, the G.S.R.s elect their Area Delegate and D.C.M. [These service positions are described in the *A.A. Service Manual*]

The Delegate carries their Area's collective group conscience to the General Service Conference.

To be effective, two-way communication between the groups and the Delegate is vital. The G.S.R. has the most challenging role in this process – keeping their home group informed about A.A. as a whole while informing the Delegate about group concerns.

Southwest Texas Area 68 is home to approximately 16,500 members from 575 groups in a geographic area spanning from Brownsville to Brownwood, Edna to Del Rio. While vital communication is a challenge, another equally important factor in necessary. Tune in next month to see how Concept III allows 'trusted servants' to meet their responsibilities.

### **Tradition Two**

"For our group purpose there is but one ultimate authority - a loving God as He may express Himself in our group conscience. Our leaders are but trusted servants: they do not govern.

A.A. is both a democracy and, in Bill W.'s words, "a benign anar-Cannot change chy." A group elects its own officers—who have no power to order anybody to do anything. (Benign – gentle, kind / Anarchy – absence of authority)

If a group wants to be a part of A.A. as a whole, it elects a G.S.R. (general service representative, with a two-year term). G.S.R.s elect area committee members and then join them in electing a deleto know the difference gate from their area to the annual General Service Conference. The Conference is about the closest thing to government that A.A. has; it produces opinions on important matters of policy; it approves the choice of some trustee nominees

for the General Service Board and directly elects others. But neither the Conference or the board or anybody else can give orders to any group or member.

Then who's in charge around here? A.A. is a spiritual movement, and so the "ultimate authority" is the spiritual concept of the "group conscience." Its voice is heard when a well-informed group gathers to arrive at a decision, and don't forget the minority opinion always get heard and gets proper consideration. Don't forget that the minority opinion can be and often is right

And remembering the first Tradition (Unity), we should go along with the decision of the group conscience. Also remember that Trusted Servants serve for the good of all, without authority over any.

#### The 2nd Step - Being Restored to Sanity

FOR THE FIRST several months in AA, I couldn't look at the Second Step: "Came to believe that a Power greater than ourselves could restore us to sanity." The implied word "insanity" drove me quickly from the First Step to the Third. I was so deluded that I could not conceive of that powerful and graphic word applying to me.

Several months passed, and I developed at least a nodding acquaintance with the other eleven Steps--but not Step Two. I continued to avoid it, because that awful word "insanity" was like a conceptual wall. Perhaps, in those early days of sobriety, the fear that I was going insane during drinking was still too fresh for me to face Step Two honestly. "Irrational," I'd admit to; "insane," I couldn't.

About this time, I joined a Step group. Every twelve weeks, the Second Step would once again appear. Finally, I developed enough honesty and self-awareness to acknowledge that some of my bizarre activities during my drinking days had been so irrational as to warrant the label "insane." But I quickly dismissed further consideration of Step Two by rationalizing that my bizarre behavior ended when my drinking did, and that I had thus been restored to sanity. After all, I no longer raced the police down the main street nor drove my motorcycle off the dock into the lake. So much for the Second Step.

More time passed, and each time the Second Step would roll around for group discussion, I'd sit through it silently, feeling it no longer had any application to me. But gradually, a nagging thought started to tell me that I was missing something. The more I heard the Step discussed, the more I knew that something was passing me by--perhaps something very important. Finally, after months of uncomfortable ignorance, it came to me: Although my insane behavior had largely disappeared with my drinking, my insane attitudes persisted. Being restored to behavioral sanity was only the preliminary part of the Second Step; attitudinal insanity was still very much a force in my life.

As I pondered this new-to-me discovery, I realized that any attitudinal insanity leads directly to inappropriate behavior, which then results in emotional pain for me and often for others. Slowly, I started to see how this worked. My personality defects, not yet checked by use of the AA program, resulted in an insane attitude, which caused inappropriate behavior, which, in turn, led to pain.

(An example I experienced involved my grandiosity. One spring day, my grandiosity became so insane that I thought I could afford a new luxury car--despite the fact that I had an almost-new car, purchased with overextended credit. So my insane attitude led to the purchase of that new car--inappropriate behavior--which in turn resulted in self-inflicted pain. Each of the next thirty-six months, I kicked myself for the higher and longer monthly car payments, which continued long after the "fix" of the new car had worn off.

Now, I see that buying the car was not an insane act--just inappropriate for me. There is nothing insane about buying an automobile, and under certain circumstances, it is fully appropriate. But the grandiose attitude that told me to buy the car when I couldn't afford it was clearly a form of insanity.

Thus, I have concluded that, while insane behavior pretty well evaporated with booze, insane attitudes linger on. Studying the Second Step has heightened this awareness; and now, beginning to work the Second Step in earnest, I find that my Higher Power is helping to identify those insane attitudes before they lead to inappropriate behavior and the inevitable, consequent pain.


