Concept VI

The Conference recognizes that the chief initiative and the active responsibility in most world service matters should be exercised by the trustee members of the Conference acting as the General Service Board.

Although A.A.'s primary purpose is spiritual in nature, A.A. is nevertheless a large corporation. Close to 80 salaried staff members work at our headquarters, contacts are made with suppliers, leases are signed, retirement benefits must be funded, copyrights are filed, public information is constantly provided, groups and potential members and professionals are all served – all paid for annually with millions of dollars contributed by the Fellowship and profits on the sale of literature.

The 21 trustees of the General Service Board [7 Class A's, non-alcoholics, and 14 Class B's, alcoholics] are all unpaid volunteers who give up large amounts of personal time to manage the legal and financial affairs of Alcoholics Anonymous. The trustees are responsible for the operation of the two wholly-owned corporations: Grapevine, Inc. and A.A. World Services, Inc.

Our Trustees are given very wide latitude of judgement and action, because the Fellowship is holding the Board mainly responsible for all of our service activities. While the Trustees must always operate under the close observation, guidance, and sometimes direction of the Conference [all of us], it is only the Board who can administer it's very large responsibilities. The conduct of our world services is a matter of policy and business. This is the basic corporate concept on which our structure of world services rests.



"An A.A. group ought never endorse, finance, or lend the A.A. name to any related facility or outside enterprise, lest problems of money, property, and prestige divert us from our primary purpose."

Early on in the history of our fellowship, it was thought that since we had found an answer for our alcohol problem. maybe we could help answer a lot of other problems. A.A. groups might want to consider going into business and financing any enterprise in the field of alcoholism. We could open up hospitals just for alcoholics and use the profits to help us do our work. We could get into education and decriminalization, and our honesty might help to clean up politics. But the early experience in trying to start "A.A." hospitals just didn't work. A.A. groups, just can't go into business; it starts up to much controversy. In no time at all, questions begin to be asked, is it medical or spiritual?, is it spiritual or religious? Are we a reform movement? Do we help drunks or educate? Thank goodness we have learned from those early experiences, that A.A. cannot be all things to all people, and nor should

we try. We also learned that cannot affiliate with any outside enterprise, but we should always be ready to cooperate, and thus help people to find our fellowship. It is our responsibility to never let anything divert us from carrying our message to the still suffering alcoholic.


Tradition Six: Long Form

Problems of money, property, and authority may easily divert us from our primary spiritual aim. We think, therefore, that any considerable property of genuine use to A.A. should be separately incorporated and managed, thus dividing the material from the spiritual. An A.A. group, as such, should never go into business. Secondary aids to A.A., such as clubs or hospitals which require much property or administration, ought to be incorporated and so set apart that, if necessary, they can be freely discarded by the groups. Hence such facilities ought not to use the A.A. name. Their management should be the sole responsibility of those people who financially support them. For clubs, A.A. managers are usually preferred. But hospitals, as well as other places of recuperation, ought to be well outside A.A.-and medically supervised. While an A.A. group may cooperate with anyone, such cooperation ought never to go so far as affiliation or endorsement, actual or implied. An A.A. group can bind itself to no one.

Note From The Delegate

Hello District 12! Thank you for the loving invitation to bring a General Service Conference report to you District meeting on May 8th! The turnout was amazing and I was so grateful to share the "New York City experience" and highlight some of the Action items with you all! Your district's enthusiasm for service to the alcoholic who still suffers was quite palpable! For those of you who were there and to those who may have missed it, here is a recap of some of the highlights from the 2016 General Service Conference: there is a new Corrections video aimed at the incarcerated alcoholic newcomer titled 'A New Freedom' (replaces the existing video 'It Sure Beats Sitting In a Cell"); the Conference 'took no action' on the development of a 'plain language' Big Book; the pamphlet 'Three Talks to Medical Societies' pamphlet will not be discontinued; an introductory paragraph for professionals will be added to the pamphlet "Problems Other Than Alcohol" that clarifies that while the language in this pamphlet may be dated, the issues are still prevalent today – a draft of this pamphlet will be brought back to the 2017 Conference; and drafts proposals regarding implementation of a Google-for-Non- Profits and Twitter accounts be developed and brought back to the 2017 General Service Conference with the proposed intent to use these platforms as a means of circulating information about Alcoholics Anonymous, but not for communication as we currently understand it in the social media sense. I will be giving a full Conference report at the Summer Workshop in Round Rock July 8-10. Check out the SWTA 68 Newsletter or aa-swta.org for the flyer and the agenda for this event and more. Step Six: "Step Six Re-examined"

"Were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character"

The more he practiced the Step, the greater the rewards

This has been the greatest challenge I have had to face. Self-centered fear combined with resentment and anger shape a formidable triangle of self-obsession. The character defects I have are manifestations of this obsessiveness. One of my personal favorites is self-loathing.

I prefer this to self-pity as it satisfies a need for machismo and martyrdom. In order to pick up the tools of spirituality, I have to put down the weapons of self. This is a difficult and ongoing task for me. I choose the action I am learning as a new path of light. I committed to not drink or use drugs no matter what.

Then I knelt and prayed. I studied the literature of the program. I went to a meeting of AA and I fellowshipped with others.

A complete psychic change is what I must undergo, each day, for this is the only gift I am given. I must use discipline, communication, humility, compassion, and simplicity as tools to bolster my spiritual condition.

The Sixth Step is sometimes called "the last preparation step." For me, it is that and much more. It is also the road to happy destiny that passes beneath the arch of freedom from alcoholism. The archway is build of the preceding five Steps.

But this is just a small part of the Sixth Step. The more thoroughly I work this Step, the greater the fruits that are shown me—not just freedom and joy, but a happiness born of serenity. And a serenity born of living in the now—the most precious grace given me by my higher power.

I define "grace" as undeserved favor. This undeserved favor serves as a blueprint for an unconditional love necessary for true self-worth. Self worth, in turn, allows for living as I want to live, not as if I want to die. Self-worth allows for living life, enjoying life, and sharing my enjoyment of life.
