Concept VII

The Charter and the Bylaws of the General Service Board are legal instruments empowering trustees to manage and conduct world service affairs. The Conference Charter is not a legal document; it relies upon tradition and the A.A. purse for final effectiveness.

As seen in Concept VI, the General Service Board is responsible for the legal and financial aspects of the corporation named The General Service Board of Alcoholics Anonymous and the two service companies it owns, AAWS, Inc. and Grapevine, Inc. The Trustees are legally empowered to act on behalf of A.A.

A method of checks and balances was created to ensure the Trustees would always be responsive to the needs of the Fellowship. The General Service Conference is where the Fellowship, through its elected Delegates intersect with the Trustees and with the staff of the General Service Office.

As Delegate I served on the Conference Committee on Trustees. Our committee reviewed the nominations for new trustees put forth by the General Service Board. The delegates had the power to reject the nominations, however only the Trustees could elect new Board members. In the 65 years of the Conference, no nominee has been rejected.

After the conclusion of the General Service Conference the Board meets to hear and vote on every Advisory Action passed during the Conference. Again, in the history of the Conference every Advisory Action has been approved by the Trustees.

The spiritual and financial powers of the Conference far outweigh the legal power of the Board. If the Trustees were to act in defiance of the will of the Fellowship, soon all monies will be cut off. Thankfully, this point has never been reached. The Board and the Fellowship have found common ground – helping the still suffering alcoholic.

"Every A.A. group ought to be fully self-supporting, declining outside contributions."



"The A.A. groups themselves ought to be fully supported by the voluntary contributions of their own members. We think that each group should soon achieve this ideal; that any public solicitation of funds using the name Alcoholics Anonymous is highly dangerous, whether by groups, clubs, hospitals, or other outside agencies; that acceptance of large gifts from any source, or of contributions carrying any obligations whatever, is unwise. Then, too, we view with much concern those A.A. treasuries which continue, beyond prudent reserves, to accumulate funds for no stated A. A. purpose. Experience has often warned us that nothing can so surely destroy our spiritual heritage as futile disputes over property, money, and authority."



But later I realized at depth that the great harms I had done others were not truly regretted. These episodes were merely the basis for story-telling and exhibitionism. With this realization came the beginning of a certain amount of humility.

Step Seven:

"Humbly asked God to remove our shortcomings"

I've noticed in sobriety that the less of an ass I am to my wife, the more likeable she becomes.

Anthony DeMello is a favorite writer of mine. From his book "Awareness," he says,
"understand that when you change, everything changes."

Alcoholics Anonymous is a program of change.

I remember an early change, after hearing an old timer repeat himself again ... and again ... and again (old-timers do that.) Annoying. He kept talking about how, each morning, he got down on his knees and prayed to stay away from a drink that day. And, if that worked out alright, then he got back down on his knees in the evening and said "thank you."

"Character-building through suffering might be alright for saints, but it certainly didn't appeal to us." (Twelve Step and Twelve Traditions, p. 74)

And, several weeks into sobriety, I was suffering - still thirsty and miserable, pains that forced me to realize that annoying old-timer had what I wanted. He had sobriety and an audible, visible peace of mind.

If I wanted what he had, maybe I should do what he was doing. Simple things like that are hard for me to see.

Making sure nobody was home to see the strange act, I got down on my knees and awk-wardly prayed that old-timer's prayer. I did it again that evening, and the next day, and the day after ... and did it again today, after a few 24 hours of sobriety. I still remember quietly realizing an early, stealthy miracle in sobriety after a few weeks of that prayer. For the first time in years, I no longer had that maddening thirst to drink.

My knees. On the ground. It's interesting to me that "humbly" (the first word of the 7th step) comes from the Latin "humilis," literally, "on the ground." This comes from "humus," which means "earth." Alcohol, that strange gift from my Higher Power, helped me to find my knees, and put them on the earth – a new way of grounding myself.

The original A.A. manuscript had the 7th step worded "Humbly, on our knees, asked Him to remove our shortcomings - holding nothing back."

"In every case, pain had been the price of admission into a new life. ... It brought a measure of humility, which we soon discovered to be a healer of pain. We began to fear pain less, and desire humility more than ever. ... We saw that we needn't always be bludgeoned and beaten into humility." (Twelve Step and Twelve Traditions, p. 75)

It's hard for me to change me, but I remind myself to stay willing with the 7th step prayer each day. The changes that have evolved in me through sobriety (usually through hardship) have been quiet gifts of grace, gifts I often don't know I've received until I use my retrospectoscope, or somebody mentions the change.

And through these changes, I've found myself with accidental happiness.
