Concept VIII

The Trustees of the General Service Board act in two primary capacities: (a) With respect to the larger matters of over-all policy and finances, they are the principal planners and administrators. They and their primary committees directly manage these affairs. (b) But with respect to our separately incorporated and constantly active services, the relation of the Trustees is mainly that of full stock ownership and of custodial oversight which they exercise through their ability to elect all directors of these entities.

Concept 8 deals with the manner in which the Trustees of the General Service Board discharge their obligations and delegate their executive function to its two subsidiary corporations: A.A. World Services, Inc., and the A.A. Grapevine, Inc. The Trustees are the guarantors of good management of A.A. World Services, Inc. and the A.A. Grapevine, Inc. The Trustees of the General Service Board meet this daunting responsibility by electing the Directors of these service arms, a part of whom must always be trustees. The executive direction of these functions is embedded in the service corporations themselves, rather than the General Service Board. Each corporate service entity should possess its own bylaws, its own working capital, its own executives, its own employees, its own offices and equipment. Thus the Trustees are not burdened or distracted by the little details and endless questions which arise daily in the routine operation of the General Service Office or the publishing operations, including the *Grapevine*.

When this concept was written, Bill emphasized that an early mistake of the General Service Board was trying to run the service functions directly. The result was "too much *concentration* of money and authority." The board must devote itself almost exclusively to the larger questions of policy, finance, group relations and leadership. The board's attitude must be that of custodial oversight.

Concept 8 has served us well since 1962. But much has changed in the financial picture the last 60 years. The separate service corporations of A.A. World Services, Inc. and the A.A. Grapevine, Inc. are facing huge challenges in this area. This separation has, to date, allowed us to avoid the *concentration* of money and authority. Maintaining this separation may not be enough to meet the challenges we now face. A plan to change our separately incorporated structure was submitted to the 63rd General Service Conference, the same time I was serving as your Delegate. The proposed plan, to have one Board serving both AAWS and the Grapevine, did not come out of the Conference Trustees Committee as a recommendation and, therefore, not debated on the floor. The proposed plan came up again as a floor action, but the Conference voted not to consider, meaning there would be no discussion on the floor. It was very interesting to being a witness to this process firsthand.

Quotes on Step 8

"We have a list of all persons we have harmed and to whom we are willing to make amends. We made it when we took inventory. We subjected ourselves to a drastic self- appraisal. Now we go out to our fellows and repair the damage done in the past. We attempt to sweep away the debris which has accumulated out of our effort to live on self-will and run the show ourselves. If we haven't the will to do this, we ask until it comes. Remember it was agreed at the beginning we would go to any lengths for victory over alcohol." Alcoholics Anonymous pg. 76

'To put a finger on the nearby and most deeply damaged ones shouldn't be hard to do. Then, as year by year we walk back through our lives as far as memory will reach, we shall be bound to construct a long list of people who have, to some extent or the other, been affected. We should, of course, ponder and weigh each instance carefully. We shall want to hold ourselves to the course of admitting the things we have done, meanwhile forgiving the wrongs done us, real or fancied. We should avoid extreme judgments both of ourselves and others involved. We must not exaggerate our defects or theirs. A quiet, effective view will be our steadfast aim.

Whenever our pencil falters, we can fortify and cheer ourselves by remembering what A.A. experience in this Step has meant to others. It is the beginning of the end of isolation from our fellows and from God.

Tradition Eight

"Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever nonprofessional, but our service centers may employ special workers."

Tradition Eight:

- Is my own behavior accurately described by the Traditions? If not, what needs changing?
- When I chafe about any particular Tradition, do I realize how it affects others?
- Do I sometimes try to get some reward even if not money for my personal AA efforts?
- Do I try to sound in AA like an expert on alcoholism? On recovery? On medicine? On sociology? On AA itself? On psychology? On spiritual matters? Or, heaven help me, even on humility?
- Do I make an effort to understand what AA employees do? What workers in other alcoholism agencies do? Can I distinguish clearly among them?
- In my own AA life, have I any experiences which illustrate the wisdom of this Tradition.
- Have I paid enough attention to the book *Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions?* To the pamphlet "AA Tradition How It Developed?"



"12th Step" work is never to be paid for.

Step Eight:

"Made a list of all persons we had harmed, and became willing to make amends to them all.

For me, the eighth step was about willingness. I had gone through the seven previous steps, and they served as a stepping stone to get me to the point that I could clearly see the wrongs that I had caused.

I made a searching and fearless moral inventory in step four and went over it with my sponsor in step five. Honestly, I was afraid the first time I did this because I had never looked at myself and my actions like that, and I definitely didn't want someone else looking at me like that, but it was a very necessary piece of the whole picture.


Having gone through the whole process of sharing my life story with another person and having a fresh perspective made it possible to see my wrongs in a new light. Making a list from this point was relatively simple. I took good notes!

The issue wasn't actually making the list. I found that becoming willing was the hurdle I had to jump. I Don't like to sound cliche, but prayer and meditation was the only way I could gain the willingness. The freedom that comes on the other side of that willingness is immeasurable.


